Profile Series #3: Spitfire MkVIII's in Australian Service GRBVers1/06

Here within this issue we present a 451Sqn Spitfire MkVIII RAAF in Italy 1944-1945. Spinner Colours need confirmation, as it seems to be yellow. These are accurate as can be made, but are open for constructive criticisms and feedback.

Profile # 1 MT687 451 Squadron (RAAF) August 1944



Details: RAF Serial: MT687. Model: LF.VIII.

Built to contract Aircraft/1877/C23©. Delivered 6MU on 21/06/44. Then delivered to 82MU on 28/06/44 for crating. Shipped on SS Samstu 30/06/44 to Casa 13/07/44.

Entered 451 Sqn RAAF squadron service early on the 16th August 1944 whilst based at Istres, and flown by <u>F/O M A Kemp</u>, <u>F/O H J Bray</u>, W/O C H Stubbes, <u>F/O R T Milner</u>, P/O G Jones, <u>F/Sqt G Hill</u>, P/O A H Davies, F/Sqt W Fields, F/O E James, F/O B McKenzie, F/O G Purdy, F/O B Sidney, F/Lt A J Robert, F/O R J Mercer, F/Sqt C Ball, and F/Sqt J F Vintner on operations almost daily until the 5th October 1944. *NB those underscored flew her more then once.*

The unit moved to Foggia, Italy some days later where they handed over their Mk VIII's to the resident MU and embarked by ship to Liverpool, England to convert to the Spitfire MkXVI model.

From there they would eventually link up with 453Sqn RAAF in 1945 at the end of the war in Germany.

As for Spitfire MkVIII MT687, she was struck-off the Air Ministry on the 29/02/45.

NEW SPITFIRE

The Museum has acquired a new Spitfire Mk XVI from Wanaka, New Zealand. The aircraft is currently being shipped from New Zealand to Australia, packaged in a container. Spitfire TB863 needed to be transported by ship as it cannot carry enough fuel to fly the distance from New Zealand to Australia. It was also considered to be an unwise choice to take the risk of flying this rare aircraft over a vast stretch of sea.

While the Museum was hoping that this new acquisition would make its public debut in August, it has been decided that there isn't enough time available for the assembly and test flying. At this stage, the Spitfire should make its debut in September.

Blayney commemorates WW2 servicemen – From the Blayney Chronicle Friday 7 July 2006 War dead will be remembered -Tim Kelly

Three new streets in Blayney township have been named after World War II servicemen who died on active service.

The three streets in the Highlands subdivision off Athol Street will be known as Lovejoy, Meek and St Vincent-Walsh Streets. Blayney Council continues, with this decision, its policy of naming new streets after local service people who were killed in action.

Lovejoy Street is named after Sergeant Douglas John Lovejoy who crashed his RAAF aeroplane accidentally near Tallow Beach on the north coast of NSW while returning from an operational flight. He was 21 at the time of his death. He was the son of Blayney residents Stanley and Margery Lovejoy.

Private Douglas Rupert Meek died as a prisoner of war during the Sandakan death march across Borneo. He was 26 at the time of his death in March 1945 and a corporal in 2/20th Battalion of the Australian Imperial Force.

Another RAAF member Pilot Officer Standish Locksley St Vincent-Walsh was killed in action over Germany while flying with the Royal Air Force's 149 Squadron in July 1941. Prior to the war he worked as a jackaroo in the Blayney district.

Sgt Douglas John Lovejoy was a member of 32SQN flying Hudson A16-198 on 7 Jul 42 when they failed to return. The crew were:

Sgt Gordon William George Ridge 416231

LAC Frederick Albert Charles Wood 24672

AC1 Edward George Merefield 25767

Their aircraft crashed into the sea off Tallow Beach between Broken Head and Byron Bay, NSW.
